

Sports Premium Funding

The government is determined to secure a significant and lasting legacy from the very successful 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games that were held in London. In order to achieve this and improve the provision of PE and sport in primary schools, additional funding has been made available for the previous academic years 2013/4, 2014/5, 2015/6 and 2016/7. Fortunately, it is going to continue for the academic year 2017/8. We receive £8000 plus £5 per eligible pupil.

At Wigmore, we believe that sport plays a crucial role in contributing to the health and well-being of our children. We have used the sports funding to enable us to:

- Increase pupil participation in competitions, interschool sport and events.
- Instil in pupils a love of sport and physical activity.
- Improve resources to support PE, including transport and equipment.
- Broaden the sporting opportunity available to pupils.
- Train PE instructors and coaches to develop sporting skill in pupils.

Far more children are now able to take part in sporting activities in the wider community both for fun and at competition level in a range of sports.

Impact of premium use 2015-16 and 2016-17 (targets for 2017-18)

<p>Impact on pupils' participation:</p>	<p>Extra-curricular clubs are offered to all children in KS1 and KS2. These include multi-skills, tag rugby, football, hockey gymnastics and dance. This has resulted in a larger group of children participating in extra-curricular sports clubs. These are open choice for KS2 pupils and multi-skills for all KS1 pupils.</p> <p>During the academic year 2015-16, 87% of pupils in KS2 are participated in after school clubs, of which 74% attended sports clubs. At KS1, 50% of pupils attended multi-skills club.</p> <p>The amount of clubs offered to children increased in 2016-17, with a club available for both KS1 and KS2 children every evening. Sports clubs offered included athletics, hockey, football, tag rugby, rounders, cricket, gymnastics, cheerleading, multi-skills and multi-sports.</p> <p>In 2017-18, we will move our focus to using coaches within school time so that all children will have the opportunity within their curriculum PE lessons to be led by inspirational coaches. In turn, this will develop teachers' subject knowledge within the school.</p>
<p>Impact on pupils' attainment:</p>	<p>This has created a greater enthusiasm by pupils, particularly inter-schools sports including netball, rounders, indoor athletics, football, cricket, tennis and cross country. The school has been successful over the last 4 years, winning various tournaments and competitions. Investment in equipment has allowed practice to help maintain these successes. Lessons are enhanced by the use of specialist sports coaches working with teachers. 5 weekly swimming blocks for each KS2 class which included the cost of transportation, hiring of the pool and instruction/lifeguard, resulting in more achievement of badges. 97% of Year 6 pupils achieved a red badge or higher meaning those children can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres.</p> <p>In 2016-17, we increased children's opportunity to participate in inter-school sports competition within our cluster. This included cross country, hockey, football, tag rugby, kabaddi, tennis, cricket, rounders and athletics. Children increased their swimming participation to 6 lessons within the block.</p> <p>In 2017-18, our aim is to increase the amount of intra-school competitions so that more children experience a competitive environment. The intra school competitions will then allow us to pick teams for out of school (inter) competitions.</p>

<p>How the premium has allowed pupils to develop an active lifestyles:</p>	<p>Seeking wider opportunities to participate in sporting activities and raising the profile of PE in the school, alongside the daily five minutes KS2 aerobics session is supported the general health and well-being of our children.</p> <p>Pupils participated in out of school clubs independently, for example Shrewsbury football club, Luctonians rugby and Ludlow tennis club.</p> <p>In 2016-17, the funding allowed us to continue to build links with Shrewsbury Town FC and Luctonians Rugby Club.</p> <p>In 2017-18, we are going to use the funding to increase children's love of sport through a stronger link with Shrewsbury Town FC through a scheme called 'Premier League Stars'. As well as developing children's and teachers' knowledge and confidence in sport, it will allow children to use the theme of sport in other areas of the curriculum, including maths, writing and in particular, reading.</p>
<p>How the school will sustain the improvements:</p>	<p>By continuing to use specialist sports coaches, we hope to ensure that our teaching staff are upskilled and proficient in many sporting activities, enabling continued delivery of successful sports teaching.</p> <p>We will also continue to benefit from the specialist high school staff teaching our pupils PE.</p>
